
A Friend Remembered



Marilyn Miller, 64, a former manager for the Internal Revenue Service and diplomat, died Jan. 12, 2010 in a traffic accident on Georgetown Pike in the Great Falls area. She lived in Great Falls, VA and spent a great deal of time visiting friends and family around the globe.

Mrs. Miller was born in San Francisco and graduated from the University of Southern California in 1967. She attended Hiroshima University in Japan and Columbia University in New York, and she received a master's degree in social anthropology in 1971 from Oxford University in England.

After retiring in 2004, Mrs. Miller travelled around the world and immersed herself in the cultures she loved. Her passion for anthropology enabled her to flourish in Italy, Greece, Egypt, and India as well as many other countries. She also volunteered as secretary of the Baltimore-Luxor-Alexandria (Egypt) Sister City Committee (http://www.baltimoreegypt.org) and chaired the Baltimore Friends of the Bibliotecha Alexandrina.

A proponent of cultural bridge building, Mrs. Miller was instrumental in creating the Egyptian Corner website which provides access to reliable information about the political, economic, cultural, educational, and social life of Egypt to the American general public, through book collections, Internet resources, and local programming. http://www.egyptiancorner.org
